

Based on extensive interviews collected from those who were there, written by Latinx playwright KJ Sanchez and commissioned by the Playhouse, *Cincinnati King* shined a spotlight on King Records — America's first racially integrated recording studio.

More than 11,000 audience members from diverse zip codes, backgrounds and ages gave nightly standing ovations. The incredibly rich (yet widely unknown) musical history of this home-grown revolutionary music label became an ambassador for our city and region!



HIGHLIGHT: 20,000 Leagues Under the Sea

The Playhouse immersed 259 participants directly in the action of 20,000 Leagues Under the Sea, a one-night-only theatrical adventure staged in rooms throughout Newport Aquarium. In four sold-out performances, attendees followed a thrilling top-secret mission to infiltrate the submarine of the international criminal known as Captain Nemo. The audience was an integral part of the twists and sacrifices that had to be made to carry out the mission successfully. Attendees received exclusive access to Newport Aquarium's animal exhibitions, hallways, backways and hidden spots.

STUDENT TICKETS — \$10 College Night and \$15 day-of Student Rush tickets.





BUILDING NEW COMMUNITIES

Going beyond the play to form new connections

A NEW COLLABORATION WITH CINCINNATI'S INDIGENOUS COMMUNITY

The Thanksgiving Play is the first play written by an Indigenous playwright (Larissa FastHorse, Sicangu Lakota) ever produced by the Playhouse. Given the writer's heritage and her work's reflection on our country's troubling history regarding our native populations, we reached out to representatives and leaders of Cincinnati's Indigenous community. With Larissa's guidance, we asked them how we could best serve their community and reflect their concerns and values.

- We hosted two Playhouse Perspectives events, three postshow discussions with the Greater Cincinnati Native American Coalition (GCNAC) members, and a community night for the GCNAC community to both engage and educate audiences.
- A large land acknowledgment statement was displayed in the lobby and printed in programs.

"It is our intention to include it in programs going forward. I think a point that needs to be made is that we at the Playhouse don't have a political agenda. But we do have a strong commitment to making the theatre a welcoming and accessible place to all of Cincinnati's diverse citizens."

ENGAGING CINCINNATI'S LATINX COMMUNITY

In the Heights created exciting opportunities to partner with new schools like the Academy of Multilingual Immersion Studies.

Cast member Tony Chiroldes (who played the father, Kevin) eagerly participated as a bilingual teaching artist at this language immersion school that has significant Latinx enrollment. We worked with 120 students who came to see the show and received five days of workshops that explored personal storytelling. They rewrote existing songs to tell their own stories that emphasized pride in themselves, their community and their backgrounds. Some students were initially reticent to share. But Tony's presence, the ability to communicate and work in a comfortable language, and the opportunity to translate for the class helped them open up.

PARTNERING WITH CINCINNATI'S JEWISH COMMUNITY

The grand opening of the Holocaust and Humanity Center (HHC) at the Cincinnati Museum Center Union Terminal (Sunday, Jan. 27, 2019) was long-awaited and highly celebrated. The Playhouse worked closely with the HHC to train their docents in storytelling and Q&A best practices to help them prepare for their new space. Through a nine-week writing and performance workshop, we also worked with nine Cincinnati Public School students to help them both understand the Holocaust and develop their own voices.

For the first three weeks of the program, the students learned the fundamentals of storytelling and transformed their own personal stories into monologues. During the following three weeks, the students wrote monologues from the point of view of local Holocaust survivors. The HHC provided video footage of survivors telling their stories, as well as research materials to provide the students context. Once those monologues were complete, the group reconvened to learn how to transition from playwright to performer and performed their works at the HHC's grand opening. The monologues of the students who were unable to perform were given to two acting interns from the Playhouse. The performance received overwhelmingly positive reviews from the audience, museum center staff and especially the survivors and their families.

Every year, the Playhouse travels "off the hill" to diverse neighborhoods outside of Eden Park to bring the experience of live theatre to students and families across our region. Through Off the Hill, the Playhouse partners with a variety of library branches, community centers and educational institutions to bring our traveling productions to those who might not otherwise get to experience live theatre. Our School Outreach Tours annually bring these performances to over 60 schools across Greater Cincinnati.

THE LAUNCH PAD PROGRAM

Embracing new methods to engage children with developmental disabilities

The Playhouse is committed to ensuring that all students in Greater Cincinnati have access to the arts, regardless of race, gender, socioeconomic status or physical abilities. Thanks in part to the generous support of The Daniel and Susan Pfau Foundation, in 2018-19 we were proud to expand and grow our theatre programs to be inclusive for students with cognitive differences.

LIVE THEATRE ACCESSIBILITY

Students who have autism spectrum disorder (ASD) and other sensory or developmental disabilities often have trouble in theatre environments. Loud sounds, lighting changes and other effects can be disorienting. Because of this, children with sensory challenges are often unable to attend live performances.

To provide more access, each December the Playhouse performs a sensory-friendly matinee of *A Christmas Carol*, making the magic and joy of a live theatre experience a possibility. This year, 230 students and their chaperones were in attendance.

SUMMER CAMP INCLUSION

Playhouse summer theatre day camps range from half-day to full-day and from one-week to multi-week experiences for students ages 3 to 18. The Playhouse strives to be open and accessible to all students. However, camp classes largely consist of "hands-on" acting, theatre games and activities, all of which involve a great deal of intangible directions, interpersonal interaction and a certain degree of spatial awareness. This presents a particularly challenging environment for students who have developmental disabilities, as well as increased demands for staff when those students participate.


This year, our brand-new Launch Pad Accessibility Program served as a pilot to integrate students who have developmental disabilities into our traditional theatre camp environment. It is one of the first camps in the region to proactively make day camp an integrated and inclusive experience for students with developmental disabilities.

CLASS EXPANSION

Our acting classes help students find their unique voice in a safe, supportive, ensemble-based environment. Programs for young people ages 3 to 14 focus on individual and collective skill development. Traditionally, our classes have been held at only the Playhouse, but this year we piloted our after-school classes with partners from around the Tristate. This was a great success and helped us to reach even more students!



ENGLISH AS A SECOND LANGUAGE PILOT PROGRAM

Over the past two years, the Playhouse has developed a specialized two-week Workshop for English Language Learners (WELL) at Roberts Paidea Academy. We work to increase students' confidence and help them successfully transition into their school's general population. During the workshops, students use both English and Spanish to complete various acting exercises; practice active listening, empathy and teamwork; and use theatrical play to step outside of their comfort zones. They create short scenes in English and Spanish, and use physical movement, vocal technique and teamwork to devise and rehearse scenes that reflect their lives. Finally, they perform their scenes, polishing and presenting their work in both English and Spanish.

PLAYHOUSE EDUCATION PARTNERSHIP (PEP) PROGRAM GROWTH

Next season, the Playhouse is thrilled to expand our PEP program: Roberts Paideia Academy and the Academy of Multilingual Immersion Studies are expected to join Silverton Paideia Academy, Rothenberg Preparatory Academy and Midway Elementary. This in-school residency immerses students in arts education programming, enhances core curriculum studies and improves verbal/literacy skills. Through PEP, we provide a full year of theatre-related programming, customizing unique residencies for each school that utilize art to develop 21st-century skills and teach key academic subjects.



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
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






























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
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
